
Album of Southern Baptist Foreign fissionaries

SUSAN ANDERSON was born April 1, 1892, in Haversham County, Georgia. Converted at age of sixteen. Graduated from Woman's Missionary Union Training School. Was Corresponding Secretary of Woman's Missionary Union of Georgia, 1918-'19. Resigned February, 1919, to join class in Yoruba Language study, taught in Baltimore, Maryland, by Dr. S. G. Pinnock, missionary to Abeokuta, Africa, who was in America on furlough. Appointed December 19, 1918, for evangelistic and educational work. Has been connected with the Girls' School in Abeokuta through her entire term of service. Abeokuta.



WILLIE KATE BALDWIN was born October 8, 1906, in Barksdale, South Carolina. At the age of seventeen she was converted and on the same day volunteered for foreign mission service. From high school she graduated in 1925. During that summer she was awarded two scholarships and that fall she entered Winthrop College and was graduated in 1929, with the B.A. degree. From Woman's Missionary Union Training School in 1934, she received the M.R.E. degree. Taught in the high schools of South Carolina. She served one year as Bible instructor in Mississippi Woman's College. Appointed June 8, 1939. Lagos.





MAURICE EUGENE BRANTLEY was born in Altoona, Florida, June 25, 1914. At the age of nine he accepted Jesus as his personal Saviour. After his conversion he was quite active in the various departments of his church. The call to the ministry came and was answered in the summer of 1932—then he felt the call to missionary work. In 1939, he volunteered for educational and evangelistic service in Africa. From John B. Stetson University he received, in 1937, his B.A. degree. He attended Southern Baptist Theological Seminary three years. Appointed April 10, 1940. Africa.



LOUISE DOYLE BRANTLEY was born December 15, 1916, in Lawton, Oklahoma. At the age of twelve she accepted Jesus Christ as her personal Saviour. The call to definite Christian service came in late high school and early college years. She received the B.A. degree in 1937 from the Florida State College for Women. Did B.Y.P.U., Sunday school, and W.M.U. work in local churches. Appointed April 21, 1936. Educational work. Ogbomosho.

WILLIAM H. CARSON was born December 27, 1887, near Sheffield, Alabama. Converted at age of seventeen. Received B.A. degree from Howard College in 1914. Attended Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, finishing with Th.M. degree, 1917. Appointed December 19, 1918, for educational work. Served several years as principal of Baptist College and Seminary at Ogbomosho. He is now doing Bible training and evangelistic work among four tribes in Niger Delta, where the great River Niger empties into the Atlantic Ocean. A launch and car are used in this difficult work. GRACE SCHIMMEL CARSON was born November 26, 1891, in Birmingham, Alabama. Her grandfather, Schimmel, who was converted under preaching of John Oncken, in Germany, came to America, 1868. The two years. 1934-'36, were spent in study at the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary—graduating with the Th.M. degree. Appointed October 18, 1937, to service in the Industrial School. Iwo.



ESTHER BASSETT CONGDON was born June 17, 1915, among the foothills nine miles west of Loveland, Colorado. At the age of twelve she was converted and united with a church of another denomination. She graduated from high school, June, 1933. The following year she attended State College at Fort Collins. While at Fort Collins she united with the Baptist church. In 1937, she transferred from State College to Wheaton College, where in June, 1938, she graduated with a B.S. degree. Appointed October 12, 1938. Married W. H. H. A. C. DONATH was born June 19, 1903, in Deanville, Burleson County, Texas. Converted at the age of twelve and felt called of God to preach. After years of resisting, yielded to the call. Entered Baylor University in 1920. Received B.A. degree in 1924; in fall of 1924, entered Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary. Received Th.M. degree from that institution in 1927. Volunteered for mission service in Africa, but finances of Board prohibited appointment at that time. Accepted the pastorate of First Baptist Church of Mart, Texas, and gave many years of service there. Appointed October 16, 1935. Evangelistic work. Shaki.



CHRISTENA BREAZELLE DONATH was born January 4, 1902, in Bertram, Texas. Converted at the age of thirteen and volunteered for foreign mission work in Africa. Attended Baylor University, graduating with the B.A. degree in 1924. Graduated from Baylor School of Nursing. Married A. C. Donath, August 22, 1927. Hoped to go immediately to Africa, but the finances of the Board prohibited appointment at that time. Appointed October 16, 1935. Shaki,



ALICE SPRAGG DUVAL* was born February 18, 1875, at St. John, New Brunswick, Canada. Educated at Northfield St. John, New School and Missionary Institute. GEORGE GREEN was born July 26, 1872, in London. Went to Canada, 1894. Licensed to preach by First Baptist Church, Woodstock, Ontario, 1899. Graduated from Woodstock College, June 1901. Came to Richmond, Va., and entered Medical College of Virginia, September, 1901. Received M.D. degree May, 1905. Attended Southern Baptist Theological Seminary. Appointed November 17, 1906, to Ogbomosho, Nigeria, West Africa, the first medical missionary sent to Africa by Southern Baptists. From the time of his appointment until October 16, 1935, when he was elected Secretary of Nigeria, he was engaged in medical and evangelistic work. He has general oversight of all Southern Baptist work in Nigeria.

LYDIA WILLIAMS GREEN was born August 28, 1880, in Norfolk, Virginia. Attended private schools in Norfolk, Graduated from Norfolk College (Mary Washington College) 1900. Married George Green, January 9, 1907. Appointed January 19, 1907. Assisted her husband in medical work until 1911, when home and maternal duties claimed a large part of her time, but did work with women and children of Ogbomosho churches. Because there are no schools for white children in West Africa, taught her four children preparing them for high school in America. Her work is among women and children, aiding especially the Woman's Missionary Union of Nigeria, Ogbomosho.







HATTIE MAE GARDNER was born Feb. 6, 1903, near Mc-Bee, South Carolina. Attended Clyde School. Converted at the age of seventeen. First missionary impression came in 1918. Definite surrender to missionary service made in April, 1928. Attended Campbell's College, Buie's Creek, N. C., two years. Graduated from Coker College with B.A. degree in 1932. Graduate work done in University of North Carolina. Engaged in mission work in mill districts. Conducted Daily Vacation Bible School; taught in B.Y.P.U. Training Institutes and in mission study classes. Appointed October 16, 1935. Educational work. Shaki.



BENNIE THEODORE GRIFFIN was born December 31, 1912, on a farm near Franklin, Texas. When he was twelve years old he accepted Christ and was baptized. In the spring of 1931, he graduated from Bryan High School. In the fall of 1931, he entered Baylor University and received, in June, 1935, his B.A. degree. The same year he went to Southern Baptist Theological Seminary and in 1938 graduated with Th.M. degree. Immediately he began home mission work in Kentucky. On February 9, 1939, he was appointed to work in the Baptist Academy. Lagos.





ALICE MAUDE LATHAM GRIFFIN was born February 1, 1913, on a farm six miles south of Belton, Texas. At the age of eleven she was converted and united with the Baptist church. ETHEL REBECCA HARMON was born July 20, 1905, at Rye, Kentucky. Converted when thirteen years of age. Worked her way through one year of high school and one year Cumberland College. 

CHARLES WILLIAM KNIGHT was born September 17, 1913, at Franklin, Tennessee. At the age of eleven he was converted and joined the Baptist Church of which his father was pastor. He entered Carson-Newman College as a premedical student. In 1935, he graduated with the B.S. degree. While a senior God's call came to him to preach, and he felt drawn to Africa. After one year at Bessie Tift, she left college due to financial conditions. She taught school in fall and winter and attended Mercer University each summer. At Mercer she met Homer Littleton and on May 28, 1932, they were married. In 1937, she rededicated her life to her Saviour. Afterwards she was led to offer her life for service in Africa. Appointed January 11, 1940. Iwo.





JAMES A. LUNSFORD was born October 7, 1910, in Paducah, Kentucky. Converted at the age of twelve and baptized. Moved to Jonesboro, Arkansas, in 1924. While a senior in high school he surrendered to preach. He entered the Junior Baptist College at Jonesboro in 1929. Was ordained the same year. Moved to Abilene, Texas, in 1931, and entered Hardin-Simmons University. Received the B.A. degree in 1933. Made the surrender of his life to missionary service while in college. Entered Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in 1934, and in 1937 received his Th.M. degree. Appointed March 14, 1940. Africa.



LENA JEWEL CONWAY LUNSFORD was born August 8, 1913, in Jackson County, Oklahoma. ANNIE BRIGGS MacLEAN* was born March 5, 1875, in Cambridge, N. B., Canada. Graduated from Provincial Normal School. Went to Africa in 1902, to teach. Appointed November 8, 1907, on the field. Married E. G. MacLean in 1908. Assisted in opening and helped to run the Industrial Mission at Iwo. Much of her time was given to the work of the dispensary. Had personal charge of feeding motherless babies and others who were undernourished. She often prepared and fed the more difficult cases every three hours until others could be trusted to follow directions. She seized every opportunity to spread the gospel in and around Iwo.






